1935 STATE BOYS' TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP

Dudley Stadium - Nashville, TN May 11, 1935

Five records were hung up Sat-urday as Johnson City won the annual Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association track and field carnival heid in Dudley sta-

dium.
The Johnson City school regis-tered 47 6-10 points to top Knoxville High, winner of the meet for the two previous years, by 20 points. The Trojans collected 27 5-10 points, Fayette was third with 15 points; Memphis Central fourth, with 12 5-19; East Nashville fifth with 18 points and 18 points ville Central sixth with 11 6-10 points.

Fifteen of the 16 schools which took part in the carnival scored

took part in the carnival scored one or more points. In addition to the six leaders, the others were: Messicks of Memphis, 5; Central of Memphis, 5; Cookeville Central, 4 6-10; Whitehaven, 8; Bartlett, 8; Collierville, 1; Hume-Fogs, 2; Tullahoma, 1; Murfreesboro, 1, and Franklin, none.

Charley Fleming, a modest, bronzed youth from Johnson City, was credited with two of the five new marks, setting records in the low and high hurdles. He skimmed ever the 120-yard high hurdles in the fine time of 15.6 seconds for his first mark. Then after a little rest, he topped the cross bars in 26.1 seconds in the 229-yard low hurdles. hurdles.

The third track record to topple was the mile relay. Wilson, Kelly, Elliott and Jennings of Memphis Tech govered the distance in 8:24.7 to clip three full seconds from the mark which was formerly held by another Memphia school, Mesnick.

Two new marks were established for the field events. Jimmy Cowell of Johnson City, threw the javelin 168 feet, six inches to add three feet to the record which was held by Clark of Morristown.

Winfrey, of Payette county, tossed the shot 49 feet 1-3 inch to hoist this mark nearly two feet. It was almost seven feet helter than any schelastic performer had ever done in Dudley stadium.

In addition to setting two records. Fleming took the individual acoring henors for the meet. He wan both hurdles events and the 100-yard dash. Fleming's grace and case in skimming over the hurdles caused many tongues to was and predict a great future for the youngster.

Ferry Ward of Knoxville took the half-mile and mile while Winfrey of Fayette county won the shot put and discus as they tied for second place honors.

Frank Fester of Nashville Central was the only local boy to take a first place medal. He romped off with honors in the 440-yard dash.

Considering the nlow condition of the track, the times in all running events were considered exception-ally good. Many were of the opinion that Ward could have clipped off from three to five sec-onds from his time for the mile had he been extended.
