IN WINNING the broad jump and quarter-mile state titles, Ward broke two NIL records he already held. His broad jump of 21-74 was almost three inches better than the record Regional jump this year and his time in the 440 was 50.7, considerably better than the record 51.0.

Spann, blonde little senior, probably is the unsung hero of East's second State crown. He ran in the shadow of Ward all season despite being an integral part of East's
